

The words two, to, and too are homophones.

(homo=same, phone=sound)

They sound same, but they have different spellings and different meanings.

The word \underline{two} is a number word. $(two = 2 = \bullet \bullet)$

The number two, (Hold two hands up, wrists outward, showing the number two on each.)

Has a W, (Bring those twos together, wrists inward, to make a w with your two peace signs.)

In the middle. (Shake your head yes with a cool, gangster vibe.)

Don't let that w make you crazy. Words with t-w having something to do with two occur often.

Think: twenty, twice, twins, twelve, between

The word **to** has **to** do with moving or reaching in a direction.



Invite your kids to write the word to, and when they cross the t, make that horizontal, crossing line into an arrow.

The word **too** can have **two** meanings. It can mean:

- 1.more than enough, above what is expected
- 2.also; as well; in addition

Too has two o's and it has two meanings!



Now you try to write some sentences using two, to, and too.

Use good handwriting, begin your sentences with capitals, add a space between words, and end your sentences with end marks.

two	I have two sisters.
to	I am going to give my bike to my brother.
too	I love you, too.
too	You are too loud.
